Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time February 10, 2019 Recall a decisive moment of life-changing magnitude. From that moment on, your life is never the same. It could have been the first time you fell in or out of love, or a family birth or death. It could have been a deployment or your first paying job. Life's moments and relationships change us. Some changes are easy, others are wicked hard.

For the fishers on Lake Gennesaret, one day would be the single most decisive moment of their lives. This rabbi, Jesus, converted their boat into his seafaring pulpit and his homily would be both visual and profound. What Jesus did and said could be observed by the crowds who'd followed him to the lake. What they saw and heard changed them, too!

We all have our routines. Simon's routine is pretty consistent. Get up, fish all day until he caught some or not. Go home and start all over again the next day. Simon's unchanging life proved dull until Jesus stepped into his boat. Simon's willingness to take on this natural land lover became the most decisive moment of his life \sim and the life of the others there, who left everything to follow Jesus, would never be routine again.

The prophet Isaiah had a mystical, life-changing moment, when a angel of God touched his lips with a hot altar coal. Now his lips were seared with The Word. His new routine radically changed. From that moment on, he faithfully preached reform and called the Chosen to remain committed to the Covenant.

In the abundance of the catch, Simon came to know his need for abundance. In the moment of his purification, Isaiah's passion meant being one with The Word as he preached God's Word. Whether your net is empty or full, do you recognize Jesus with you in your boat/on your faithjourney? When you are touched by the Word of God, do you echo Isaiah's words, "Here I am, send me?" Be decisive for God's sake.

Learning Faith: Anointing and Pastoral Care of the Sick



R.C.I.A. Rite of Christian Initiation of Adult is journey of adults exploring the Catholic Faith. Baptism, the **First Rite** and anointing, initiates us into a life of conversion with our indwelling Trinitarian God. As a Child of God we receive the gift of Faith, become members of the Church and our faith community. Prior to 1962, Catholics in danger of death, could request Extreme Unction, or last anointing, the **Last Rite** of one's faith journey. Vatican Council called the Church to

renew every aspect of theological life and worship, including our Sacrament and Rites.

Extreme (last) Unction (anointing) became Anointing and Pastoral Care of the Sick. Jesus offered healing to all kinds of folks, from demonic possession to leprosy. His offered his healing to all who suffered, in mind, body or spirit, as well as those who were dying.

In 1964, Anointing and Pastoral Care of the Sick replaced the term Extreme Unction, indicating the broader, pastoral scope of this Sacrament. Those who suffer from chronic mental or physical illnesses, those who are pre-surgery or post surgery, those suffer from prolonged depression, addiction, etc., are offered Christ's healing presence, forgiveness, and strength.

At the Chrism Mass during Holy Week, the local Ordinary blesses the oils used in Sacraments/Rites by every parish in the diocese. The Oil of the Catechumens is used during Baptism. The Oil of Chrism is used at Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Orders, and the consecration of churches and bishops. Chrism is a mixture of oil and sweet-smelling balsam. The Oil of the Sick (oleum infirmorum) is used in anointing the sick. The priest lays his hands on the sick/elderly person, says specific prayers, then anoints the person's forehead and hands in the form of a cross. On the forehead: "Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit." R/. Amen. On the hands: May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up." R/. Amen. The "raising" refers to spiritual healing, as well as any physical healing that may take place.

Through Anointing and Pastoral Care of the Sick, God gives the sick person grace and strength to bear the illness or infirmity. In addition, many Catholics have seen the power of this anointing to bring spiritual, emotional, and even physical healing.
